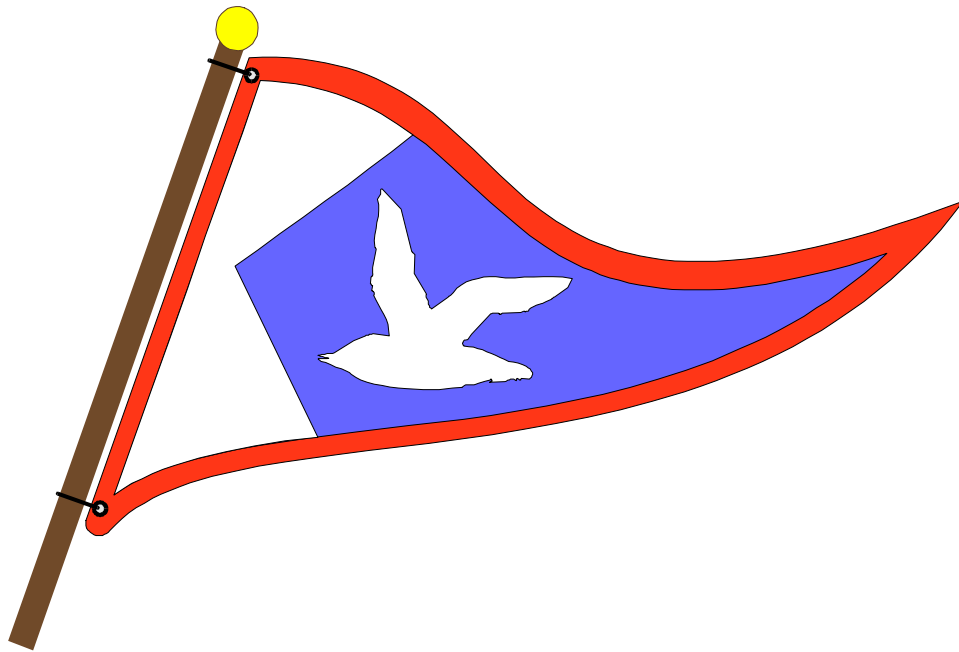

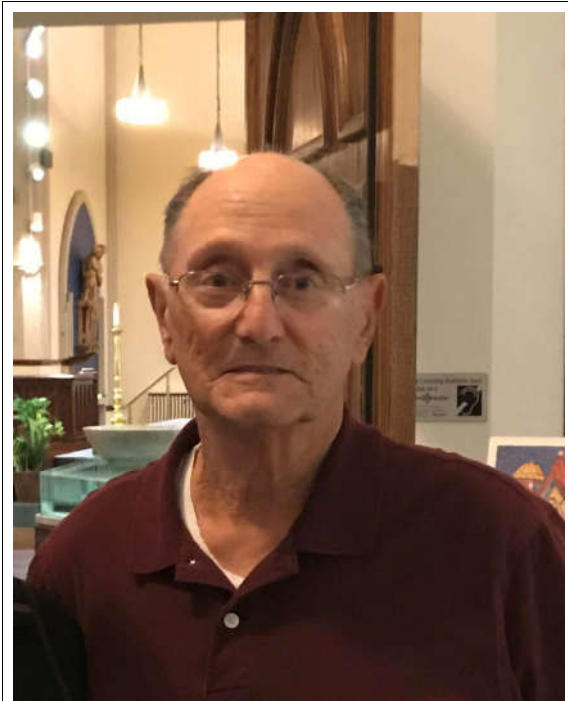

Our February 6 trip to Portage and Luumi Bay to see birds didn't start out with a great deal of promise. Fog was clearing in the marina, but dense fog minutes out of the marina necessitated navigation by radar. After we broke through the fog, nearing Portage, the day was gorgeous. Celie's son, Abe, identified Buffleheads, Long-tailed Ducks, Surf Scoters, Common Mergansers, Common Loons, Western Grebes, Red-necked Grebes, Horned Grebes, Short-billed Gulls, Olympic Gulls, Pigeon Guillemots, Double-crested Cormorants, Pelagic Cormorants, Common Murres, Marbled Murrelets, Goldeneyes, Great Blue Heron, Brant, and a Bald Eagle. It was such a nice day we decided to check out Alden Banks. It's a long way out there in our slow boat, and we didn't see as many birds as we had seen on the south side of Portage and in Hale Passage, so we headed home and made it into our slip just as the last rays of daylight disappeared behind Lummi Island.

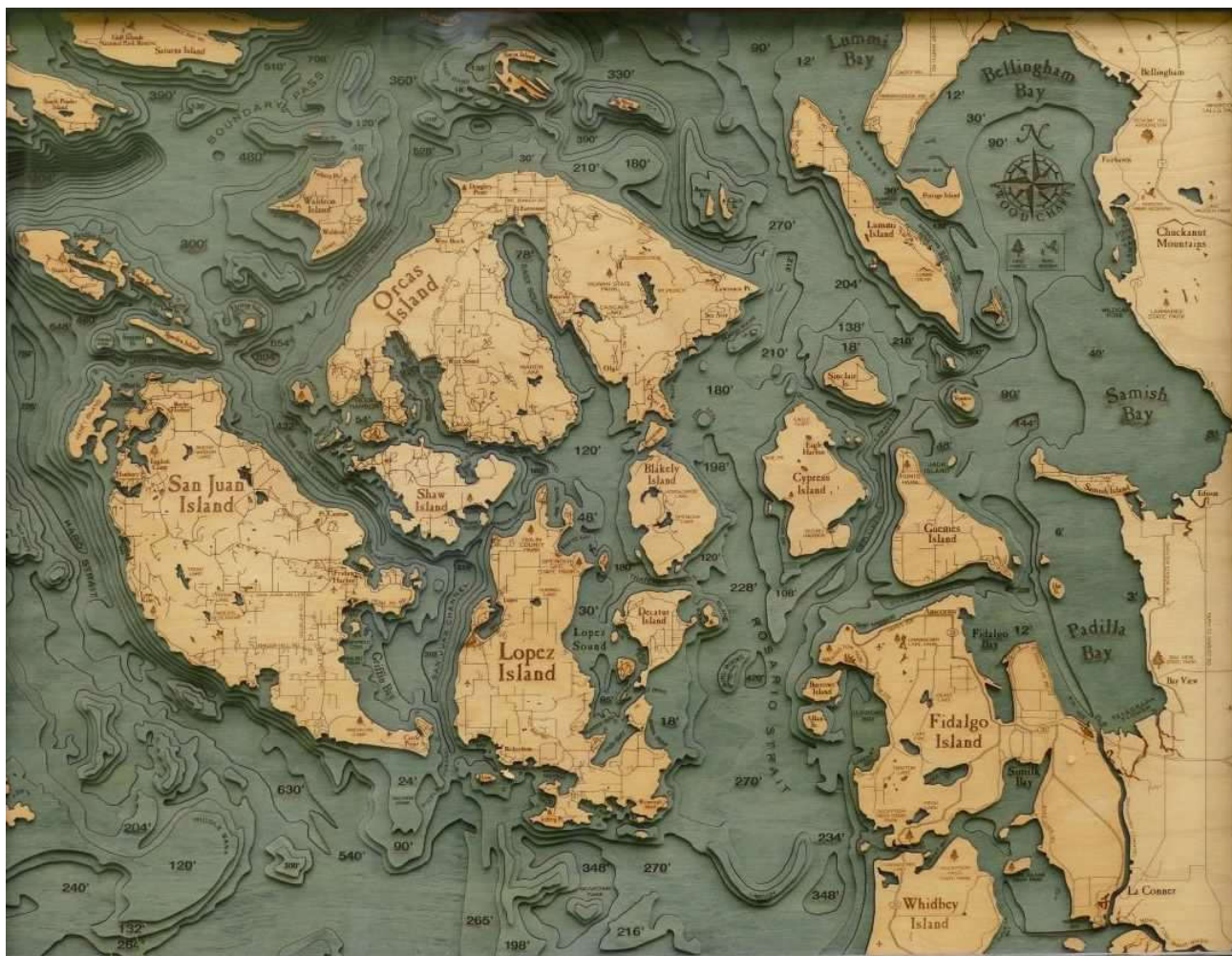

The location was amazing, it was within easy walking distance of the center of Friday Harbor. It was so much closer to town than when we stay at the marina!

Friday Harbor was also quite devoid of tourists and we were able to see parts of it that we missed during our usual visits there in July. We actually located D. Jone's Locker on the marina dock and a small free lending library in the park above the dock. It was fun to visit when there were not crowds of people.

On Saturday morning we called Salish Sea Taxi and their driver Becky picked us up at Memorial Park and drove Marvin, myself and our dog Dellie to Lime Kiln State Park. We asked to be picked up in a couple hours and walked the length of the park to the beautiful lighthouse, scanning the water for whales. At one point Marvin saw a spout of white water and there was a pod of Orca whales. They started off being far away but swam in our direction. When they got to be directly in front of us, one of them breached! It was amazing to see! We watched until we could no longer see them. It was one of the highlights of the trip. Even if you don't get to see the whales, Lime Kiln Park has beautiful views of the Haro Strait and Canada and its not very strenuous to hike there.

Overall, we had a wonderful visit to Friday Harbor. I cannot thank the Blackwells enough for the opportunity to stay at their slip and making it available to SYC members and I would highly recommend it to everyone.

New Haul Out Technology

We recently had Salish Nomad hauled for some cosmetic work on our green topside gelcoat. The work is in progress at North Harbor Yacht service in Anacortes. I thought it might be of interest to the members to explain a bit about the machine that North Harbor uses to haul their customers' boats. No cumbersome, slow, traditional Travelift for these folks. New to me, but not to North Harbor, is the Sealift boat transport. All they need is a boat ramp and a reasonable tide level. In place of the usual "sling straps," or bunks, the boat is supported by low-pressure, sausage looking air bags. On our 34-foot tug we had nearly full length support between the keel, and the chine. Unlike a Travelift, the boat operator and any crew are allowed to stay aboard during the transport. The boat can be moved and placed directly into a building in one operation.
