SUCIA WORK PARTY 2025: IT WAS A GOOD TIME!

Last year SYC combined forces with the Flounder Bay YC of Anacortes to help as best we could to keep Sucia Island fresh and nice along with enjoying time with others who like spending time on the water like we do. We all had a very good time meeting old and new friends and there was interest in doing it again and the invitation was extended and accepted. So, we reserved Fossil Bay's large shelter for Sept 12 & 13, but the event largely carried through from Thursday to Sunday. To help things go along this year we had some members meet Friday afternoon to preview the projects Ranger Steve Sabine had in mind for us which was helpful to expedite things after a short briefing from him and a review of tasks to be done. It wasn't a perfect arrangement, but things seemed to go reasonably smoothly. Another time, we'll work on some improvements.

I would like to give credit to each person for the work they did, but it was near impossible to keep track with the large number of people, many of whom helped with multiple tasks. So below is a list of all the work that was accomplished along with a list of the boats and crews who participated. I hope I didn't miss anyone.

Indeed, a lot was done and with all the hands, it was completed in relatively short order. Steve seemed quite pleased with the results, which should provide some satisfaction for everyone involved.

- 1. Two buildings and one side of a third located on the north side of the marsh were painted.
- 2. Four barrier logs were removed and replacements carried into separate campsites.
- 3. A good amount of invasive English Ivy was removed.
- 4. Gravel was hauled and placed to raise a trail at north Shallow Bay, above the mud.
- 5. Some trail repairs were done at the N-end of Shallow Bay Beach involving some rock and dirt reconstruction.
- 6. Upper road brushing on the east road from Mud Bay to Echo Bay most of a half mile of brush was cut back from the roadway for passage of their utility vehicles.
- 7. Several Fossil Bay campsites were trimmed and cleaned up.

At the end of the day, a good amount of work was accomplished. Credit goes to everyone who came. Not only that but there is hardly a better way to get to know people than working with them. I expect we all know a bit more about each other than we did when we arrived. I know each time I learn more than a little about some amazing talent and experiences shared among this bunch.
