These are short, easy runs that proved popular in the recent survey and should draw good participation, which makes them friendly for first-time captains or anyone wanting to and if two captains happen to have complementary plans, that's a bonus.

Another favorite spot of ours is at Friends Landing near Montesano, WA. It is run by the Port Of Grays Harbor and is a little gem. It is located between Lake Quigg and the Che-Human- halis River. The place is popular with locals because it has a boat launch for fishing, a playground for the kids, and a trail around the lake besides RV and Tent camping sites. We book a site that allows us to see Lake Quigg from our rear window, which is only steps away. While there are no sewer hookups, there is a dump station onsite with a \$10 fee. With a little conservation, we have managed to stay four nights.

There's a popular restaurant, Ranch House BBQ, that's closer to Olympia. The park is only ten miles to Aberdeen so getting essentials is easy to do during our stay or to pick up something from the store to barbeque. There is a Thriftway grocery store in Montesano, but their selection is very limited.

Friends Landing is a good base from which to explore. We've done day trips to Lake Sylvia State Park, Lake Aberdeen and the fish hatchery there, the WWPS site at Satsop, Ocean Shores, Seabeck, Moclips, Olympia, and Lake Quinault. Last year we didn't have to go anywhere to see something that's been on our

Bucket List for years. We finally got to see the Northern Lights when they were so prevalent in May of 2024. The show lasted for over an hour, so we stayed up late and I took way too many pictures!
